ANTICIPATING FUTURE SKILLS Central Queensland Region

Employment in Central Queensland is projected to grow by 3.8% over the next four years. Close to 25% of the Central Queensland workforce will be employed in blue-collar industries such as construction, mining and manufacturing. However, the health care and social assistance industry is projected to be the fastest-growing and largest-employing industry by 2027-28.

By 2027-28, it is projected* that there will be:

135,361 people employed in this region +4,965 additional workers since 2023-24



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By 2027-28, Central Queensland is projected to experience the eleventh-fastest increase in employment in Queensland. It is projected to comprise 4.4% of the state's workforce.
