ANTICIPATING FUTURE SKILLS

Gold Coast Region

Approximately 60% of the Gold Coast region's workforce is projected to sit within the five largest industries by 2027-28. Health care and social assistance is projected to be the fastest-growing industry and will employ more than 15% of workers in the region. Public administration and safety is projected to be the second-fastest-growing industry.

By 2027-28, it is projected* that there will be:

376,740 people employed in this region
+22,009 additional workers since 2023-24





By 2027-28, Gold Coast is projected to experience the fourth-fastest increase in employment in Queensland. It is projected to comprise 12.4% of the state's workforce.

There are 19 SA4s in Queensland; the five Brisbane SA4s have been combined in this report to take into account the larger natural labour market. Queensland - Outback SA4 has been disaggregated into its SA3 components. Data is based on Place of Work.
