

ANTICIPATING FUTURE SKILLS



Mackay - Isaac - Whitsunday Region

Mining is projected to remain an important industry in the Mackay - Isaac - Whitsunday region, employing more than 17% of the region's workforce. However, above-average employment growth in industries such as health care and social assistance, public administration and safety, and arts and recreation services reflect the region's diversity.

By 2027-28, it is projected* that there will be:

119,334 people employed in this region

+3,918 additional workers since 2023-24



Mackay - Isaac - Whitsunday is projected to experience the thirteenth-fastest increase in employment in Queensland. It is projected to comprise 3.9% of the state's workforce.

* Projections are based on the 2024-25 State Budget and are not directly comparable to subsequent Budget Update forecasts for aggregate employment growth. As these projections are high level, indicative and subject to change, it is recommended that the focus be on employment trends rather than the numbers in isolation. The regions used in this project are based on Statistical Area Level (SA4) regions, as defined by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. There are 19 SA4s in Queensland; the five Brisbane SA4s have been combined in this report to take into account the larger natural labour market. Queensland - Outback SA4 has been disaggregated into its SA3 components. Data is based on Place of Work.
