Outback South Region

Almost half of all workers in Outback - South will be employed in three industries - agriculture, forestry and fishing, health care and social assistance, and public administration and safety. The fastest growth in the region will be in rental, hiring and real estate services, followed by electricity, gas, water and waste.


