ANTICIPATING FUTURE SKILLS Townsville Region

Employment in public administration and safety is projected to experience the fastest growth of all industries by 2027-28, reflecting the region's role as a major defence hub and provider of government services. Health care and social assistance is projected to be the second-fastest growing industry, comprising the largest share of Townsville's workforce – 18% of all workers.

By 2027-28, it is projected* that there will be:

By 2027-28, Townsville is projected to experience the ninth-fastest increase in employment in Queensland. It is projected to comprise 4.5% of the state's workforce.
