Wide Bay Region


Health care and social assistance is projected to be the largest-employing and fastest-growing industry in Wide Bay by 2027-28, reflecting the region's ageing population. It is a diverse region, with significant levels of employment across industries as varied as construction, retail trade, and education and training.

By 2027-28, it is projected* that there will be:

137,460 people employed in this region

+4,613 additional workers since 2023-24





By 2027-28, Wide Bay is projected to experience the twelfth-fastest increase in employment in Queensland. It is projected to comprise 4.5% of the state's workforce.
