Arts and recreation services




The arts and recreation services industry engages in the preservation and exhibition of objects and sites of historical, cultural or educational interest; the production of original artistic works and/ or participation in live performances, events, or exhibits intended for public viewing; and the operation of facilities or the provision of services that enable patrons to participate in sporting or recreational activities, or to pursue amusement interests. It includes museums, racing, gambling activities, performing arts, zoos and fitness centres.

By 2027-28, it is projected^{*} that there will be:
