

ANTICIPATING FUTURE SKILLS

Far North Region

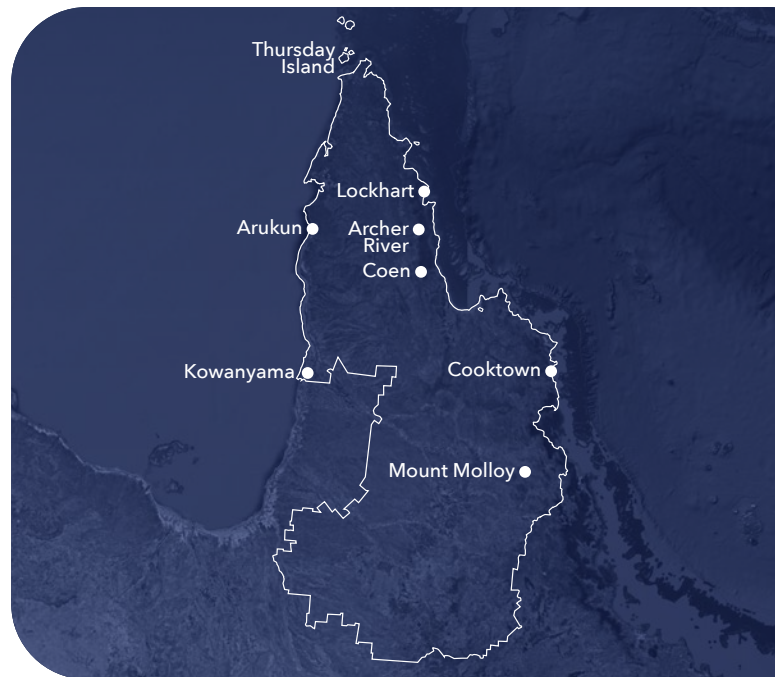


Employment in the sparsely populated Far North region is dependent on four key industries. Public administration and safety, and health care and social assistance, are the two largest-employing industries. However, rental, hiring and real estate services is projected to be the fastest-growing industry by 2027-28. Employment in Mining is projected to fall slightly, positioning it as the fourth-largest industry in the region.

By 2027-28, it is projected* that there will be:

14,268 people employed in this region

+159 additional workers since 2023-24



By 2027-28, Far North is projected to experience the fourteenth-fastest increase in employment in Queensland. It is projected to comprise 0.5% of the state's workforce.

* Projections are based on the 2024-25 State Budget and are not directly comparable to subsequent Budget Update forecasts for aggregate employment growth. As these projections are high level, indicative and subject to change, it is recommended that the focus be on employment trends rather than the numbers in isolation. The regions used in this project are based on Statistical Area Level (SA4) regions, as defined by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. There are 19 SA4s in Queensland; the five Brisbane SA4s have been combined in this report to take into account the larger natural labour market. Queensland - Outback SA4 has been disaggregated into its SA3 components. Data is based on Place of Work.
