Ipswich Region


Health care and social assistance is projected to remain a strong and growing industry in the Ipswich region. While manufacturing is projected to grow only slightly, it will employ almost 13% of the region's workforce by 2027-28. Above-average employment growth is projected for a number of industries, such as education and training.

By 2027-28, it is projected* that there will be:

170,959 people employed in this region

+9,518 additional workers since 2023-24





By 2027-28, Ipswich is projected to experience the sixth-fastest increase in employment in Queensland. It is projected to comprise 5.6% of the state's workforce.

As these projections are high level, indicative and subject to change, it is recommended that the focus be on employment trends rather than the numbers in isolation.

The regions used in this project are based on Statistical Area Level (SA4) regions, as defined by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. There are 19 SA4s in Queensland; the five Brisbane SA4s have been combined in this report to take into account the larger natural labour market. Queensland - Outback SA4 has been disaggregated into its SA3 components. Data is based on Place of Work.
