Gold Coast region

These AFS Series projections for 2019-2024 were finalised prior to the emergence of COVID-19 and do not take into account the impacts of the pandemic.#

Employment in the Gold Coast SA4 region reflects its status as a major tourism hub, with more than 1 in 5 workers projected to be employed in Retail Trade or Accommodation and Food Services. Health Care and Social Assistance was projected to be the largest employer and was projected to grow by more than 20 per cent by 2024.

By 2024, it was projected that there would have been:

370,297 people employed in the Gold Coast SA4 region*

+38,651 additional people from 2019





By 2024, the Gold Coast SA4 region was projected to experience the second fastest increase in employment in Queensland. It was projected to comprise 13.6% of the state's workforce.

The regions used in this project are based on Statistical Area Level 4 (SA4) regions, as defined by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. There are 19 SA4s in Queensland; the five Brisbane SA4s have been combined in this report to take into account the larger natural labour market.
