




Employment in Central Queensland by 2024



Almost 5,600 new workers by 2024





Technology and jobs



- Initial estimates of jobs at risk of automation varied between 9 and 47 per cent
- Subsequent research indicates technology is more likely to impact tasks meaning jobs will evolve rather than disappear altogether
- People will perform less manual, physical and repetitive tasks and undertake more technical and creative roles
- "Soft" skills will increase in importance




Skills required by employers now




What did we learn?

- Doesn't necessarily mean university qualification – VET, short courses, seminars, on-thejob training, etc.



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
