



ANTICIPATING FUTURE SKILLS SERIES

Darling Downs -Maranoa region

Due to a declining population, employment in the Darling Downs - Maranoa region is projected to fall slightly by 2025-26. Some of this loss will be in Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing but the industry will continue to be a dominant force in the region. Employment in some other industries, such as Construction, will expand. While a relatively small workforce, employment in Professional, Scientific and Technical Services is projected to grow at the highest rate.

By 2025-26, it is projected that there will be:

By 2025-26, Darling Downs - Maranoa is projected to experience a slight decline in employment in Queensland. It is projected to comprise 2.4% of the state's workforce.

* The regions used in this project are based on Statistical Area Level (SA4) regions, as defined by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. There are 19 SA4s in Queensland; the five Brisbane SA4s have been combined in this report to take into account the larger natural labour market. Queensland - Outback SA4 has been disagregated into its SA3 components. Data is based on Place of Work.
