



ANTICIPATING FUTURE SKILLS SERIES

Moreton Bay - South region

The four largest industries in Moreton Bay - South are projected to employ more than half of the region's workforce by 2025-26. Retail Trade is projected to be the largest employing industry, while Health Care and Social Assistance is projected to experience the fastest growth in the region.

By 2025-26, it is projected that there will be:

By 2025-26, Moreton Bay - South is projected to experience the fifth fastest increase in employment in Queensland. It is projected to comprise 3.9% of the state's workforce.

^{*} The regions used in this project are based on Statistical Area Level 4 (SA4) regions, as defined by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. There are 19 SA4s in Queensland; the five Brisbane SA4s have been combined in this report to take into account the larger natural labour market. Queensland - Outback SA4 has been disagregated into its SA3 components. Data is based on Place of Work.
