Outback - North region

Employment in Outback - North is dominated by the Mining industry, which is projected to employ almost 4 in 10 people. Accommodation and Food Services is projected to be the fastest growing industry by 2025-26, reflecting increased regional tourism.

By 2025-26, it is projected that there will be:

22,310 people employed in this region*

+581 additional workers since 2021-22

By 2025-26, Outback - North region is projected to experience the 13th fastest increase in employment in Queensland. It is projected to comprise 1.2% of the state's workforce.

Queensland - Outback SA4 has been disagregated into its SA3 components. Data is based on Place of Work.
