## Wide Bay region

Wide Bay is projected to be the fastest growing region in Queensland due, in part, to strong levels of population growth. It is a diverse region, with significant levels of employment across industries as varied as Education and Training, Construction and Manufacturing, but the dominant industry is Health Care and Social Assistance.

By 2025-26, it is projected that there will be:

133,252 people employed in this region\*

+15,926 additional workers since 2021-22



By 2025-26, Wide Bay is projected to experience the fastest increase in employment in Queensland. It is projected to comprise 4.6% of the state's workforce.

<sup>\*</sup>The regions used in this project are based on Statistical Area Level 4 (SA4) regions, as defined by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. There are 19 SA4s in Queensland; the five Brisbane SA4s have been combined in this report to take into account the larger natural labour market. Queensland - Outback SA4 has been disagregated into its SA3 components. Data is based on Place of Work.
